Dr. Stacey Patton is an adoptee, child abuse survivor, and former foster youth turned award-winning journalist, author, nationally recognized child advocate, and college professor. Her writings on race, higher education, culture and politics, and child welfare issues have appeared in The New York Times, Washington Post, BBC News, Al Jazeera and other outlets. She has appeared on MSNBC, CNN, ABC News, Democracy NOW, FOX News, and other outlets. Dr. Patton has won numerous journalism awards and in 2015 she received APSAC's award for Outstanding Service and Advancement of Cultural Competency in Child Maltreatment Prevention and Intervention. She is the creator of www.sparethekids.com, an online portal designed to teach parents about the harms of hitting children. Dr. Patton is also the creator of the forthcoming interactive 3D medical animation app called "When You Hit Me," scheduled for release in 2023. She is also a research associate professor at Morgan State University's Institute for Urban Research, and teaches digital journalism at Howard University. Dr. Patton is the author of *That Mean Old Yesterday*, *Spare the Kids: Why Whipping Children Won't Save Black America*, and the forthcoming *Strung Up: The Lynching of Black Children in Jim Crow America*.
